He has taught global political economy at Tohoku University, politics and economics at Miyazaki International College and political economy and business at Kansai Gaidai University in Japan, as well as International Relations at Chung-Ang University, political economy and public policy at Kyung Hee University and East Asian political history at Yonsei University in South Korea. He has published extensively on the politics and political economy of north-east Asia, as well as on technology policy and international security.

MAYUMI FUKUSHIMA is a doctoral candidate in the Department of Political Science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Her research interests include International Relations and security studies. She was a deputy director at the Japanese foreign ministry (1999–2010), primarily responsible for US–Japan relations and international security issues. Her research areas include the causes of war, crisis management, regional security in Asia, nuclear proliferation, game theory and strategic decisions. In 2018–2019 she is a Smith Richardson Foundation Predoctoral Fellow in International Security Studies at Yale University. She is completing the research and writing for her doctoral dissertation: 'Exploitative friendship: how asymmetric alliance partners manipulate one another'.
