
NOESTANGO + QUINTETO REVOLUCIONARIO



NOESTANGO is the result of two years of research carried out by **grupo noestango**, in collaboration with **Quinteto Revolucionario**, and raises a question about tango as an artistic expression, taking into account its glorious past and its present so marked by a cultural industry that strives to keep it intact and with little chance of reinventing itself.

Five dancers in search of rediscovering their artistic identity in the twilight of tango fashion. Five musicians who appropriate and bring to their present a canonized and untouchable music. They are united by the question of what to do today with that legacy, of which only nostalgia remains for the once music of Buenos Aires and a dance devastated by the cultural industry.

What happens when a music and a dance closely tied to the past are immersed in a present full of deconstructions and ruptures?





QUINTETO REVOLUCIONARIO

Considered by critics and experts as the most important group in the world in the interpretation of Astor Piazzolla's music, the Quinteto Revolucionario is integrated by Sergio Rivas on double bass, Sebastián Prusak on violin, Cristian Zárate on piano, Lautaro Greco on bandoneon and Esteban Falabella on electric guitar.

Winners of the 2019 Latin Grammy Award and nominees for the same award in its 2021 version, in the Best Tango Album category for the album **100 Años**.

They are the benchmark group of the Astor Piazzolla Foundation and recently toured Colombia and participated in the *Piazzolla 100* concert at the Luna Park Stadium.

N O E S T A N G O

Dance group created by Ollantay Rojas, Lisandro Eberle and Milagros Rolandelli, whose main objective is the creation and authorship of tango dance pieces for the stage. The group performed at the Usina del Arte together with the quintet of the composer Diego Schissi, produced and developed the Choreographic Research Laboratory at the 25 de Mayo Cultural Center, premiered the work *Aleatorio y Repetir* as part of the Hotel Tango cycle, participated in the video clip of the Escalandrum group at the Kirchner Cultural Center and held an artistic residency at the San Martín Cultural Center in 2021, which gave rise to this project with guest dancers Marcela Vespasiano, David Palo and Nicolás Minoliti.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

SPACE

- · Stage or scenic space of an approximate minimum of 10 by 10 meters.
- · Black dance linoleum.
- · Minimum height: 4 meters.
- · Cyclorama or black curtain for video projection, located at the back of the stage.

INSTRUMENTS

- · Double bass.
- · Vertical or a Baby Grand piano, tuned up to 442 or 440 bright (it is slowly moved by the interpreters during the performance).

SOUND

- · Wireless microphones and return on stage

- · 22 P64 MFL
- · 8 Ellipsoidal zoom 1000w
- · 10 P56 VNSP
- · 6 floor stands
- · 2 tripods for 4 luminaires 3 meters high
- · 9 floor circuits (5 left, 4 right) distributed in 7 channels
- · 3 shed lamps (provided by the company if necessary / reference photo attached) with incandescent bulbs 300w each
- · 3 dimmers 6 channels 2K Lighting plot attached
